MEMORANDUM OF TELEPHONE CONVERSATION

SUBJECT: TELCON with Prime Minister Bhutto of Pakistan

PARTICIPANTS: The President

Prime Minister Bhutto initiated the telephone call from New York City to the President staying at Camp David concerning her visit with the President, and the Prime Minister's commencement address at Harvard University.

The President and Prime Minister Bhutto exchanged greetings and pleasantries concerning her visit and stay in the United States.

The President noted his recent conversation with Indian Prime Minister Gandhi and relayed to him a very positive view of Prime Minister Bhutto's recent visit. Prime Minister Bhutto expressed some surprise at learning of the Gandhi/President Bush conversation and requested details. The President said he told Gandhi that Prime Minister Bhutto was willing to work on the Treaty and that the President was very pleased with what the two were trying to accomplish.

Prime Minister Bhutto discussed her recent address at Harvard University where she spoke about the Association of Democratic Countries. The President acknowledged the speech, but had not reviewed the material. Prime Minister Bhutto offered to send specifics concerning the Association to the President. The President expressed his pleasure at having the opportunity to review it.

Prime Minister Bhutto expressed her wish that the President would be able to accept her invitation to visit Pakistan. The President thanked her for the offer.

The President asked Prime Minister Bhutto for any additional thoughts she might have on Afghanistan and assured her that the US would like to stay with Pakistan in that area, and help were possible.

The two parties wished each other well and concluded the call.
