Kennebunkport

The President telephoned President Mubarak concerning the situation in the Persian Gulf region. (Ø)

The President: Hosni, how's the world's greatest diplomat? (U)

President Mubarak: Fine, fine. (U)

The President: I'm calling on a closely held matter. | (b)(1)

President Mubarak: I will study this and call you tomorrow if I can. (Ø)

The President: Okay, please do call. |

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Please be frank with me.

President Mubarak: I will study this very sincerely. (S)

The President: Everything else seems to be going very well. I am pleased with the UN action. We must stop the Iraqi shipping. It is not fair to our and your soldiers out there in the heat to allow these ships to just go steaming by. We will interdict them if we have to. (S)

President Mubarak: We must be very firm in the sanctions. (S)

The President: I was very pleased with the Soviet reaction. At the beginning I was worried, but not now. They seem to want to be part of the response to the problem. (S)

President Mubarak: It is good that you have brought them in. (S)

The President: Hosni, let me know if you have any other suggestions. You know that you gave me the original suggestion for all this here in Washington long before Saddam Hussein came on the scene. You told me to get on the phone and call these other leaders. (S)

President Mubarak: Oh, thank you. (U)

The President: My only problem is if you invite my old friend Muammar Qadhafi. (S)

President Mubarak: I will study your ideas and phone you tomorrow afternoon.

The President: Thank you and goodbye. (U)
