The President: Here is my list of subjects I think we should cover. (U)

PM Kaifu: I would like to hear especially about the Soviet aid issue and there are several things I want to ask you. (2)

The President: Good. I will say a few words. The U.S. and Japan are the closest together on how we see the summit. I do not think we will be asked for a check, but if we are, we do not have one. Bessmertnykh and Moiseyev were here this morning and gave us a letter. You will get yours. We do not want to rebuff Gorbachev. But before there is real money, there must be real progress. We will support you on the Northern Islands. One last point: I would like this summit to be perceived as a success for John Major. That is basically the way we see this summit.

PM Kaifu: I gave my ideas to you in writing. We are close together. I want to support the U.S. position.

The President: Sure. Another thing, the EBRD. They are trying to increase the Soviet lending. (2)

The President: I will see Mitterrand Sunday. I would hope to convince him that the Bank should concentrate on, the focus should stay on Eastern Europe and not go wandering off.

PM Kaifu: We have exactly the same view. (2)

The President: One more thing on the Soviet Union. It is good that Gorbachev and Yeltsin are now working together. We want to let them feel like they are in friendly hands, but we cannot do anything big, like the stabilization fund. (\mathcal{C})

The press will try to dwell on the problems between us. One is the Desert Storm contribution. You were extraordinarily generous and we appreciate the last \$500 million. I will have (Secretary) Brady say the issue is closed in a way that gets Rostenkowski off our back.

The next thing is rice. We should agree on what we should say because the press will try to divide us. (\mathscr{L})
