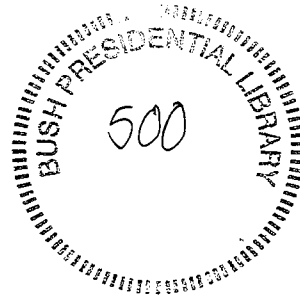

PM Keating: How pleased we are to have you here. We were crestfallen at the postponement, but delighted now. (U)

The President: It really was the Congress beating on me. At the outset, let me say Bob and I had a close personal relationship, but this is not a personal affair and I will deal with you as with Bob Hawke. That is why I invited your children to go to Canberra with us. (Ø)

PM Keating: I met you in 1971. I was in Washington on an exchange. (He then described other meetings.) Bob and I had an interesting partnership for eight and one half years. We fashioned the U.S. policy.
