Dear Mr. President:

The United States, the United Nations coalition against Iraq and all of humanity confront a profound challenge. We and the other nations of the coalition bear a moral responsibility to act immediately to meet the desperate needs of the hundreds of thousands of Kurds that face immediate starvation, freezing, and death.

I am urgently calling for humanitarian relief to innocent civilians seeking to escape the slaughter and who are freezing and starving before our eyes and underneath our overflying aircraft. Such humanitarian relief does not constitute military intervention in a civil war.

I urge you to direct an immediate airlift of blankets, tents, food and medical supplies. Those supplies should be delivered both north and south of the Iraq border.

It is not sufficient to supply relief to those Kurds lucky enough to reach Turkey or Iran, as important as that is. Nor is it enough to simply urge Turkey to open its borders to those who reach it, although that diplomatic effort to persuade Turkey is vital and should continue. It is the uncountable hundreds of thousands of Kurds who are freezing and starving while struggling to escape Iraq who are at the greatest risk.

We must act -- and act now before more Kurds perish. We have the supplies available. We have the airlift capability available within hundreds of air miles of the Kurds.

The United States and our coalition partners should make it clear to the Iraqi forces of Saddam Hussein that we will allow no interference with these relief efforts. In unmistakably clear terms, Saddam Hussein should know that we will take necessary action to assure the delivery of these materials to the Kurds.

While these humanitarian aid efforts are underway, we should seek a United Nations ultimatum to Saddam Hussein to stop the slaughter of civilians. Such an ultimatum, backed by the threat of force and continued sanctions if Iraq doesn't stop the slaughter, would not constitute U.N. intervention in a civil war. Rather, such an ultimatum would be part of an ongoing struggle against a regime the U.N. is still at war with and with whom it has no cease fire agreement.

Dear Senator Levin:

President Bush has asked me to respond to your letter of April 5, 1991 regarding your concern for the plight of Iraqi refugees/displaced civilians fleeing to other areas of Iraq and neighboring countries in the wake of Saddam Hussein's brutality

The U.S. Government, in coordination with other governments and international organizations, has been actively involved in providing assistance to these refugees and displaced persons. Our immediate objective to provide life-sustaining assistance to the Iraqis on the Turkish border has been accomplished. The long-term objectives of assisting the Iraqis to return home voluntarily and turning the operation over to the United Nations are well-advanced.

Operation Provide Comfort, the relief effort mounted for the Iraqis in Turkey and Iraqis massed at the Turkish/Iraqi border, is the largest U.S. relief effort mounted in modern military history. Assistance provisions include: food, potable water, shelter, and medical care for the refugees/displaced persons.

As of June 1, over thirty countries were reported to have contributed more than \$714 million in grants and relief supplies to the international humanitarian effort for Iraqi refugees and displaced persons. The U.S. Government has made by far the largest contribution to this effort; funds expended exceed \$212 million dollars. President Bush has authorized the use of \$140 million for humanitarian relief operations for Iraqi refugees from Department of Defense assets. for International Development's Food for Peace program has now contributed over 41,000 metric tons of rice, vegetable oil, and wheat flour valued at approximately \$31.6 million for the relief effort. President Bush recently approved another \$10 million from the Emergency Refugee and Migration Assistance (ERMA) funds for relief assistance to Iraqi refugees in Iran and Turkey for a total contribution of \$23 million from the Bureau for Refugee Programs at the State Department.

Additionally, the Office of Foreign Disaster Assistance at the Agency for International Development has contributed nearly \$12.5 million.

We hope the day will soon arrive when all Iraqi displaced persons and refugees can return to their homes to live in peace and free from repression. Until then, together with the international community, the U.S. Government will continue all relief efforts in the region.
