Purpose

To report to Congress on the recently announced deployment to the Persian Gulf region.

Background

Congressmen Fascell and Broomfield wrote on October 26, 1990, in response to media reports that you had decided to send some 100,000 additional troops to the Gulf (Tab D). They noted that, if the reports were accurate, such a decision had been taken without consultation with appropriate congressional leaders and "anticipate" that the Administration will report to Congress within 48 hours of the decision consistent with section 4(a)(3) of the War Powers Resolution.

Legislative advisors strongly recommend that you send identical letters to the Speaker and President Pro Tempore of the Senate providing information on the deployment and updating your letter of August 9.

Section 4(a)(3) of the War Powers Resolution requires a report in the event the Armed Forces are introduced "in numbers which substantially enlarge United States Armed Forces equipped for combat already located in a foreign nation." Senior Administration counsel believe that, notwithstanding the doubling of our Forces in the region, this provision is inapplicable. They conclude that deployments to the Gulf have been on-going since August and that, therefore, no report is required as a matter of law. On the other hand, they note that other provisions of the Resolution require the President to

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provide information to Congress on request and to provide periodic reports, at least once every six months, on the status, scope, and duration of any deployment reportable under the Resolution in the first instance. To preserve our legal position with respect to the inapplicability of section 4(a)(3) of the Resolution, the letters prepared for your signature do not mention the War Powers Resolution (Tabs A and B). In the event Congress challenges the absence of such a reference, we could note that the letters in substance meet the criteria for a periodic report. In order to avoid implying that the War Powers Resolution's 60-day clock requiring withdrawal from hostilities has been started by this most recent development, the letters reaffirm your August 9 judgment that hostilities are not imminent. Some may see this reaffirmation as inconsistent with our efforts to increase pressure on Saddam Hussein.

I recommend that you update your August 9 letter (Tab C). I shall respond to Congressmen Fascell and Broomfield on your behalf and enclose copies of your letters to the Speaker and President Pro Tempore.

State, Defense, Justice, the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and Boyden Gray concur in the text of the letters (Tabs A and B).

I want to emphasize that this deployment is in line with the steady buildup of U.S. Armed Forces in the region over the last 3 months and is a continuation of the deployment described in my letter of August 9. I also want to emphasize that the mission of our Armed Forces has not changed. Our Forces are in the Gulf region in the exercise of our inherent right of individual and collective self-defense against Iraq's aggression and consistent with U.N. The deployment will ensure that the coalition has an adequate offensive military option should that be necessary to achieve our common goals.

In my August 9 letter, I indicated that I did not believe that involvement in hostilities was imminent. Indeed, it was my belief that the deployment would facilitate a peaceful resolution of the crisis. I also stated that our Armed Forces would remain in the Persian Gulf region so long as required to contribute to the security of the region and desired by host governments. My view on these matters has not changed.

I appreciate the views you and other members of the congressional leadership have expressed throughout the past 3 months during our consultations. I look forward to continued consultation and cooperation with the Congress in pursuit of peace, stability, and security in the Gulf region.

Dear Mr. President:

On August 2, 1990, Iraq invaded and occupied the sovereign state of Kuwait in flagrant violation of the Charter of the United Nations. In the period since August 2, Iraq has massed an enormous and sophisticated war machine on the Kuwaiti-Saudi Arabian border and in southern Iraq, capable of initiating further hostilities with little or no additional preparation. Iraq's actions pose a direct threat to neighboring countries and to vital U.S. interests in the Persian Gulf region.

In response to this threat and after receiving the request of the Government of Saudi Arabia, I ordered the forward deployment of substantial elements of the United States Armed Forces into the region. I am providing this report on the deployment and mission of our Armed Forces in accordance with my desire that Congress be fully informed and consistent with the War Powers Resolution.

Two squadrons of F-15 aircraft, one brigade of the 82nd Airborne Division, and other elements of the Armed Forces began arriving in Saudi Arabia at approximately 9:00 a.m. (EDT) on August 8, 1990. Additional U.S. air, naval, and ground Forces also will be deployed. The Forces are equipped for combat, and their mission is defensive. They are prepared to take action in concert with Saudi forces, friendly regional forces, and others to deter Iraqi aggression and to preserve the integrity of Saudi Arabia.

I do not believe involvement in hostilities is imminent; to the contrary, it is my belief that this deployment will facilitate a peaceful resolution of the crisis. If necessary, however, the Forces are fully prepared to defend themselves. Although it is not possible to predict the precise scope and duration of this deployment, our Armed Forces will remain so long as their presence is required to contribute to the security of the region and desired by the Saudi government to enhance the capability of Saudi armed forces to defend the Kingdom.

I have taken these actions pursuant to my constitutional authority to conduct our foreign relations and as Commander in Chief. These actions are in exercise of our inherent right of individual and collective self-defense. I look forward to cooperation with the Congress in helping to restore peace and stability to the Persian Gulf region.

Dear Mr. President:

On Thursday, October 18, 1990, Secretary of State Baker testified before the Committee on Foreign Affairs on the current situation in the Persian Gulf. In response to several questions by Members, Secretary Baker repeatedly stated that the Administration will fully consult with the Congress regarding current and, to the degree possible, anticipated actions in the region.

We are concerned about press reports which indicate that the Executive branch has decided to send as many as 100,000 additional troops to the region.

If indeed such a decision has been made, we regret that the Administration did not seek to consult with appropriate Members of Congress. Such a decision cannot be justified by any time constraint or any national security interest that would preclude full and immediate consultation with the Congress.

Recognizing the difference of opinion between the Executive and Legislative branches as well as within the Congress itself on the constitutionality of the War Powers Resolution of 1973, we anticipate that the Administration, consistent with section 4(a)(3) of the War Powers Resolution, will submit to the Congress within 48 hours of its decision a report detailing the circumstances necessitating additional U.S. troops, the constitutional and legislative authority for such a decision, and the estimated scope and duration of this deployment.

The Congress has strongly supported U.S. policy in the Persian Gulf. In fact, as you are well aware, there has been widespread agreement on both sides of the aisle that the Administration has handled the crisis exceptionally well to date. In particular, there has been praise for your actions to bring about an international coalition of nations in support of a policy aimed at isolating Iraq and its supporters politically, diplomatically, economically and militarily.

We are concerned that such support could erode absent effective, full, and prompt consultation with the Congress. Such a result would be neither in the interest of the Administration, the Congress, nor the nation.

We therefore expect that you will engage in appropriate consultation as well as report in a timely and complete manner with respect to any additional deployments of U.S. forces to the Persian Gulf or significant changes in their mission there.

Dear Mr. President:

On August 2, 1990, Iraq invaded and occupied the sovereign state of Kuwait in flagrant violation of the Charter of the United Nations. In the period since August 2, Iraq has massed an enormous and sophisticated war machine on the Kuwaiti-Saudi Arabian border and in southern Iraq, capable of initiating further hostilities with little or no additional preparation. Iraq's actions pose a direct threat to neighboring countries and to vital U.S. interests in the Persian Gulf region.

In response to this threat and after receiving the request of the Government of Saudi Arabia, I ordered the forward deployment of substantial elements of the United States Armed Forces into the region. I am providing this report on the deployment and mission of our Armed Forces in accordance with my desire that Congress be fully informed and consistent with the War Powers Resolution.

Two squadrons of F-15 aircraft, one brigade of the 82nd Airborne Division, and other elements of the Armed Forces began arriving in Saudi Arabia at approximately 9:00 a.m. (EDT) on August 8, 1990. Additional U.S. air, naval, and ground Forces also will mission is defensive. They are prepared to take action in concert with Saudi forces, friendly regional forces, and others to deter Iraqi aggression and to preserve the integrity of Saudi Arabia.

I do not believe involvement in hostilities is imminent; to the contrary, it is my belief that this deployment will facilitate a peaceful resolution of the crisis. If necessary, however, the Forces are fully prepared to defend themselves. Although it is not possible to predict the precise scope and duration of this deployment, our Armed Forces will remain so long as their presence is required to contribute to the security of the region and desired by the Saudi government to enhance the capability of Saudi armed forces to defend the Kingdom.

I have taken these actions pursuant to my constitutional authority to conduct our foreign relations and as Commander in Chief. These actions are in exercise of our inherent right of individual and collective self-defense. I look forward to cooperation with the Congress in helping to restore peace and stability to the Persian Gulf region.

Dear Mr. President:

On Thursday, October 18, 1990, Secretary of State Baker testified before the Committee on Foreign Affairs on the current situation in the Persian Gulf. In response to several questions by Members, Secretary Baker repeatedly stated that the Administration will fully consult with the Congress regarding current and, to the degree possible, anticipated actions in the region.

We are concerned about press reports which indicate that the Executive branch has decided to send as many as 100,000 additional troops to the region.

If indeed such a decision has been made, we regret that the Administration did not seek to consult with appropriate Members of Congress. Such a decision cannot be justified by any time constraint or any national security interest that would preclude full and immediate consultation with the Congress.

Recognizing the difference of opinion between the Executive and Legislative branches as well as within the Congress itself on the constitutionality of the War Powers Resolution of 1973, we anticipate that the Administration, consistent with section 4(a)(3) of the War Powers Resolution, will submit to the Congress within 48 hours of its decision a report detailing the circumstances necessitating additional U.S. troops, the constitutional and legislative authority for such a decision, and the estimated scope and duration of this deployment.

The Congress has strongly supported U.S. policy in the Persian Gulf. In fact, as you are well aware, there has been widespread agreement on both sides of the aisle that the Administration has handled the crisis exceptionally well to date. In particular, there has been praise for your actions to bring about an international coalition of nations in support of a policy aimed at isolating Iraq and its supporters politically, diplomatically, economically and militarily.

We are concerned that such support could erode absent effective, full, and prompt consultation with the Congress. Such a result would be neither in the interest of the Administration, the Congress, nor the nation.

We therefore expect that you will engage in appropriate consultation as well as report in a timely and complete manner with respect to any additional deployments of U.S. forces to the Persian Gulf or significant changes in their mission there.



Section 4(a)(3) of the War Powers Resolution requires a report to Congress within 48 hours of the introduction of U.S. Armed Forces "in numbers which substantially enlarge United States Armed Forces equipped for combat already located in a foreign nation." Senior Administration counsel believe that, notwithstanding the doubling of our Forces in the region, this provision is inapplicable because, as a legal matter, the most recent deployment decision merely continues the deployments begun in August. On the other hand, counsel note that section 4(b) of the Resolution provides that the President shall provide such other information as "Congress may request in the fulfillment of its constitutional responsibilities with respect to committing the Nation to war and the use of United States Armed Forces abroad," and that section 4(c) requires the President to report at least every six months to Congress on the status, scope, and duration of deployments that are reportable under the War Powers Resolution in the first instance. To preserve our legal position with respect to the inapplicability of section 4(a)(3), the letters prepared for the President's signature do not mention the War Powers Resolution (Tabs A and B). In the event Congress challenges the absence of such a reference, we could note that the letter in substance meets the criteria of section 4(c).

The letters update the letter sent August 9 (Tab C). In order to avoid implying that the War Powers Resolution's 60-day clock requiring withdrawal from hostilities has started, the letters

reaffirm the President's August 9 judgment that hostilities are not imminent. Some may see this reaffirmation as inconsistent with efforts to increase pressure on Saddam Hussein.

State, Defense, JCS, Justice, and White House Counsel concur.

I shall separately send you for signature a response to Congressmen Fascell and Broomfield, forwarding copies of the President's letters.
