#### Access

Collection is open to all researchers. Access to Bush Presidential Records is governed by the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA)(5 USC 552 as amended) and the Presidential Records Act (PRA)(44 USC 22) and therefore records may be restricted in whole or in part in accordance with legal exemptions.

#### Copyright

Documents in this collection that were prepared by officials of the United States government as part of their official duties are in the public domain. Researchers are advised to consult the copyright law of the United States (Title 17, USC) which governs the making of photocopies or other reproductions of copyrighted material.

#### Provenance

Official records of George Bush's presidency are housed at the George Bush Presidential Library and administered by the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) under the provisions of the Presidential Records Act (PRA).

#### Processed By

Staff Archivists, 1996–1997. Previously restricted materials are added as they are released.

#### Scope and Content

The materials in JL006 (Law Enforcement – Police Matters) are a systematically processed body of documents from the White House Office of Records Management (WHORM) Subject File. This secondary subject category contains letters and memoranda. A number of letters are from police officers or police organizations such as the Fraternal Order of Police and outline views regarding pending legislation, administration policy, and criminal matters. Many letters call for increased funding in order to hire additional police officers to fight violent crime, especially drug-related crime. Letters from the general public voice concerns about police brutality in the wake of the Rodney King incident and the subsequent Los Angeles riots in 1992. Letters of response from the White House outline the administration's support

for additional police officers, and the administration's views regarding the Rodney King beating and the Los Angeles riots.

**System of Arrangement**

Records that are responsive to this FOIA request were found in Bush Presidential Records: WHORM Subject Files.

The WHORM Subject File compiled by the White House Office of Records Management is comprised of a series of documents assigned a letter/number combination and filed in a subject category.
